

# Penrallt Baptist Church



There are two important dates in the Christian calendar this month, Ascension Day on May 5<sup>th</sup> and Pentecost on May 15<sup>th</sup>.

They're not like Christmas, which everyone celebrates with cards and presents, even if they're not Christians. And most people realise when it's Easter, because of the hot cross buns and Easter eggs, and the Bank Holiday Monday the day after. But Ascension Day isn't a public holiday, and although BBC Radio 4 has an Ascension Day service, only a minority of the population will notice.

Pentecost used to have a Bank Holiday attached to it — Whit Monday. But in 1978 the UK government decided to replace it with a new holiday — the Spring Bank Holiday — which would always be on the last Monday in May. This made it less likely that the general public would realise when Pentecost takes place.

So Ascension Day and Pentecost are festivals observed mostly by Christians, with the rest of the population hardly noticing. But they both mark important events in the story of Jesus, and his saving work for us.

The Ascension brings to an end the 40 day period during which the disciples met with the risen Christ on a number of occasions. It underlines the fact that Jesus is Lord ("God exalted him to the highest place" – Phil. 2:9). It helps us to recognise that he is now "our great High Priest in heaven" (Heb. 4:14-16). And it prepares us to wait expectantly for his return ("This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way as you have seen him go into heaven." Acts 1:11).

Also, the Ascension is connected with the coming of the Holy Spirit, which we celebrate on the day of Pentecost. After the first Christians had received the Holy Spirit, the apostle Peter explained this connection in his sermon recorded in Acts 2. "Exalted to the right hand of God, he (Jesus) has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear" (verse 33).

On the day of Pentecost we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit in power on the first Christians. Before that they weren't really Christians in the full sense of the word. They were disciples, they were believers, but the full experience of being a Christian includes the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

The Holy Spirit does a number of important things for us:

He seals our relationship with God. "The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children." (Rom. 8:16)

He helps us to behave like Christians. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control." (Gal. 5:22,23)

He gives us the confidence to tell others about Jesus. Jesus promised: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

He gives us various abilities, to enable us to play our part in the life and the mission of the church. "There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work." (1 Cor. 12:4-6)

There's plenty for us to celebrate. Don't let Ascension Day and Pentecost go past without saying a big thank you to God for all that he has done for us through Jesus Christ and through his Spirit.

# **Christian Aid**

Christian Aid has a network of partners around the world. They work with local communities to reduce the risk of disaster and build resilience.

When disasters and emergencies strike, they are ready to respond and help save lives and rebuild communities after earthquakes, floods, famine and other disasters. One of the emergency areas Christian Aid is helping at the moment is the drought in Ethiopia.

There are more than 10 million people in Ethiopia urgently needing access to food supplies and water as the country faces its worst drought



in 30 years. The farmers haven't been able to harvest any crops for two consecutive planting seasons, and supplies are dwindling.

In the hardest-hit communities, families are going hungry as they struggle to find enough food to eat, and more than 400,000 children are experiencing severe malnutrition. Without urgent funding to address the food shortages, the humanitarian situation will deteriorate even further.

Earlier this year Christian Aid released £50,000 of emergency funds to help. This money has been used to provide school meals for more than 4,000 children whose families do not have enough food, and also to make sure that 700 children in two schools have access to safe drinking water.

Much more needs to be done, and Christian Aid are currently doing further assessments to plan the next steps in their emergency response. During Christian Aid Week we can help donate to this emergency situation.
